Women's safety

- 1 in 2 women feel unsafe walking alone after dark in a quiet street near their home, compared to 1 in 7 men.
- 71% of women of all ages have experienced sexual harassment in public spaces; 86% of women aged 18-24
- 60% of people who reported feeling unsafe during the day, and 40% who reported feeling unsafe after dark, had **altered their behaviour**, as a result, in the previous month.
- Compounded impact with racism, ableism, homophobia, and transphobia

(ONS, 2021)





Safety concerns for disabled people



- Disabled people feel less safe walking alone in all settings than non-disabled people (ONS, 2021).
- Inadequate pavements, pavement parking and pavement clutter pose serious safety and accessibility risks for disabled people (Disabled Citizens' Inquiry, 2023)





Racial disparities in Stop & Search

 Outside of London, Black people are 43x more likely to be stopped and searched without justification than white people.





Socioeconomic inequalities in road safety

- Areas of high deprivation are disproportionately harmed by:
 - more road collisions
 - worse air quality

 In Scotland, kids are 3x to suffer injuries from a road collision in high deprivation areas than in lower-deprivation area



Design and Behaviour Change



- Wider behaviour change required from perpetrators

- As designers and members of project team, we have a direct impact on infrastructural solutions

- Amplifying the voices of historically marginalised groups is **critical**

Thinking carefully about your stakeholders and their needs is the first step to getting the engagement right.

- Target activities to engage underrepresented communities
- Consider how engagement can
 - Support and strengthen communities
 - Change power dynamics

NCN Accessibility Fund 23/24





Improving access to the National Cycle Network for everyone

Funds to remove or modify restrictions on the National Cycle Network (NCN).

Who can apply?

Anyone who owns, manages or has permission to implement change

What can you apply for?

Up to 100% of costs, max £50,000 **Removing** or **modifying** barriers and restrictions

Criteria

On the NCN Completed by end of March (new fund in spring!) Monitoring & impact Community & stakeholder support
