- Make traffic-free National Cycle Network routes and PfE areas more enjoyable and attractive places to explore
- Encourage and build confidence in local communities to use active travel (walking, wheeling and cycling) to visit or experience the project.

The creation of good public artwork provides real opportunities for community engagement and involvement. In our case, that community engagement was recognised with a major award from the Association for Heritage Interpretation. The real benefit, though, is that extensive community engagement helps to protect the artwork, because the community has a sense of ownership. Similarly, it is well documented that public space art helps to deter "taggers", i.e. casual graffitists, who are known to respect good artwork.
